- People
- People from many countries
- People with diverse backgrounds
- People with diverse skills
- People who want to bring Python forward

What does the PSF do?

- Protects the IP in Python
- Funds conferences & sprints
- Funds Python related projects
- Runs PSF projects
- Helps spread the word about Python





...so where's the problem?



Need for change

- PSF is regarded as closed organization
- PSF has problems reaching out to the community
- Identity problem: PSF membership status is difficult to define; lack of interest from the members



Membership size

- PSF was founded in 2001:16 members, 2 sponsor members
- June 2012:204 members, 26 sponsor members



Membership model

• 2001 – 2014:

Members have to be nominated by other PSF members and then get voted in by the membership (once or twice a year)

Sponsor members can sign up for membership, but also need to be voted in by the membership (once or twice a year)

Result: Very slow membership growth





- New PSF Associate Membership
- Only USD 99 (EUR 79) per year, which the PSF will use for funding and running projects

New membership model

- Basic members
- Supporting members
- Sponsor members
- Managing members
- Contributing members
- **Fellows**



Basic members

- Sign-up via webform
- no voting rights
- no fees to pay
- may attend members meetings
- open to anyone, anywhere



Supporting members

- Basic membership +
- voting rights
- yearly fee or lifetime fee



Sponsor members

- legal persons only
- yearly fee
- voting rights via delegates
- various sponsor levels
 - each with different benefits and number of delegates
- voted in by voting members



Managing members

- Basic membership +
- voting rights
- need to sign up to at least one working group and invest at least 5 hours work per month
- requirements revisited on a yearly basis; conversion to basic membership in case requirements are no longer met



Contributing members

- Basic membership +
- voting rights
- need to invest at least 5 hours work per month contributing to (Python related) open-source projects
- requirements revisited on a yearly basis; conversion to basic membership in case requirements are no longer met



- Basic membership +
- voting rights
- need to be nominated by other Fellows
- need to be voted in as Fellow by 2/3 of the voting members
- stay Fellow for life
- nominated members as-of June 2013 are eligable as Fellows and were given the choice to become Fellows or convert to other membership forms



Voting members

Special group of members:

All members with voting rights, who have indicated that they want to use this right

- Voting rights must be reestablished each year (via checkbox)
- Members lose voting rights for a the remainder of a year in case more than 4 votes are not cast



Voting made easy

- Special online voting software
- Based on the OSS eVote system developed by Massimo di Pierro and David Mertz: https://github.com/mdipierro/evote
- Already used by OSI at https://elections.opensource.org/



Membership size

- PSF was founded in 2002:16 members, 2 sponsor members
- March 2013:
 283 members, 28 sponsor members
 Proposal for new membership model
- June 2013:
 Only 157 members signed up as voting members



Vision: Part 2

- Turn the PSF into a community organization
- Allow members to easily run work groups with access to PSF resources



Work Groups

- Can be proposed by any member
- Voted in by voting members or **PSF** board
- Integration into the PSF defined by work group charta
- Can get their own budget



Timeline

- June 2013/ Feb 2014: Bylaws WG working out the membership change details (https://bitbucket.org/vanl/psf-bylaws/src)
- Feb/March 2014: PSF Board adopts the new bylaws
- April 2014: Start opening up the flood gates :-)
